NSF GRFP is one of the premier opportunities to fund graduate study, providing 3 years of funding which includes a \$34,000 annual stipend and full cost of tuition/fees. This is a reminder that the application deadline for the Comparative Literature Study Abroad Program in Paris, Fall Quarter 2016, is March 1st, 2016 and coming fast!

This interdisciplinary program offers students a unique opportunity to earn 15 UW credits while living and studying in one of the most vibrant and beautiful cities in the world. The program is open to all UW and non-UW students with an interest in the humanities and arts, and who have completed FRENCH 103 by the beginning of the program. (Please note that the language prerequisite can be met by starting the FRENCH 101-3 series during Winter Quarter or by taking the intensive FRENCH 134 during the summer).

The program fee is \$6,400. This includes tuition, housing and board.

Program Description:

The Husky Presidential Ambassadors (HPA) Leadership Institute is a unique opportunity for current UW students and incoming first year Chinese international students to participate together in a cross-cultural leadership development immersion experience. Globalization has created a need for leaders with greater understanding of cultural differences and increased competencies in cross-cultural communication and practice. HPA Leadership Institute participants will gain valuable skills in intercultural communication, explore cultural perspectives of leadership and study leadership practices in a global setting. The HPA Leadership Institute is an innovative education model that will cultivate global leaders who think beyond boundaries.

Students selected as Husky Presidential Ambassadors will spend one week in academic preparation in Seattle (8/15-8/19) before traveling to Beijing, China for two weeks (8/21-9/3). They will spend the first week in Beijing, China visiting historical sites and being exposed to Chinese cultural surroundings. The cohort of incoming first year Chinese international students will join the current UW student cohort during the second week to participate in an experiential leadership development curriculum. Participants will connect leadership theory to practice by meeting with local and national government officials, business leaders and community change agents while also engaging in skill-building and self-reflective opportunities to accelerate their personal leadership development. In the fall, participants will continue this leadership education opportunity through a domestic-international student exchange program on campus.

Program details

- ❑ Students will stay in dormitories at the prestigious Tsinghua University, an important international partner of the University of Washington.
- ❑ Students will receive 5 GEN ST credits.

Pre-requisites/Language Requirements

- ❑ This program is designed for current UW undergraduate students from any major and incoming first year international students from China who are interested in accelerating their leadership development in this cross-cultural exchange.
- ❑ Proficiency in the Chinese language is not required.

Cost, Financial Aid and Scholarships

- ❑ The cost to participate is \$3,500 + \$325 study abroad fee. This includes airfare, lodging, and most meals.
- ❑ Most forms of financial aid can be applied to study abroad. You can verify that your financial aid award will apply to your program costs by contacting the Office of Student Financial Aid.
- ❑ A \$2,500 scholarship will be available to every Pell Grant/State Need Grant-eligible student accepted to this program.

● **Landscape Architecture Croatia: Design/Build Croatia Fall 2016**

In collaboration with students and faculty from the University of Rijeka, Departments of Fine Art, Engineering and Pedology, we will be living and working in Rijeka, the 3rd largest city on Croatia in the Karvner region on the Adriatic sea. In this program we will create a sensory therapeutic garden for use by the blind or those with compromised vision, disabled adults, kindergarteners and high school students on the grounds of a former monastery, now a dormitory for high school and college students and a functioning catholic church. In addition will create a master

plan for Dom Turnic, a residential facility for disabled adults. Students will work together to explore and implement principles of therapeutic environmental design, cultural place attachment, traditional building techniques of Croatia and ecological design to create this sensory garden and master plan.

Following the 2014 Ebola outbreak, [global health experts explained](#) all the ways the world wasn't ready for a full-blown pandemic. According to science journalist [Sonia Shah](#) (The Fever), they're right. In *Pandemic*, she profiles the rise of Cholera, one of history's deadliest pandemics, and ties it to modern disease outbreaks like Ebola, avian influenza, MRSA, and more. Based on extensive research and personal experience, she'll outline what she's learned about pandemics— that a simple start can eventually claim the lives of healthy people around the

world. She'll also give insight into what a pandemic would look in the next two generations and, more importantly, what steps we can take to prevent it before it's too late.
